That's one of the most repeated verses scattered throughout several Psalms.

There are times in life to give thank and exclaim God's blessing. It feels like that's been hard to do over the last six months. But this month we have reason to give thanks.



Our church council has determined we have entered phase two of our regathering process meaning we have an opportunity to move into in-person worship.

We have set a regathering date of Oct. 4th. So mark that time on your calendar.

Our worship options in Oct include:

8am Parking Lot Worship with in-person communion.

10:30am in-person worship with communion

10:30am livestream worship with virtual communion (gather bread and wine/grape juice in home)

There are measures in place to keep us socially distanced.

Seating arrangements will be spread out and masks will be used while indoors.

Our regathering chart has been modified to reflect the state's guidelines looking at total Covid hospitalizations in the region remaining under 15% of hospitalized patients.

Our church sanctuary capacity for regathering allows us to include 50% of our worship space to include social distancing measures ensuring safety precautions.



You may be ready to return in-person or you may not be. Both are holy decisions to be prayerfully considered and respected. Remember that covid has not gone away, but our region has significantly decreased in hospitalizations.

Ultimately, what matter most is that we are the baptized, God's beloved children and that's what's important.

We have a chance to remain connected in worship to God and to one another as God's people that we might be sent out into the world to share that message of love.

You are loved and always a place of belonging in God's kingdom whether you choose to be in-person or choose to worship from home.

Know that whatever decision you make, God is going to walk with you.

Continue to pray for our leaders making these preparations, for our church that we might be united in this critical time, and for our world that still needs God's hopeful grace in challenging time.

And whether we continue to worship online or in-person, let always give thanks to the Lord for he is good, his mercy endures forever!

Off-The-Screen Faith Activities

We have certainly learned how to utilize technology as a helpful tool to navigate our work, school and family lives through this pandemic. But sometimes it is nice (and necessary) to step away from the computer. Here are five ideas to practice faith that don't involve sitting in front of a computer screen. Thanks to our friends at buildingfaith.org for compiling these and many other great ideas! What other ideas can you think of?

- ♦ Home Altar—Set up a space in your home and decorate it with meaningful items such as a cross, candles, photos of loved ones, special faith objects, a bowl of water (baptism), etc. Use this as a place for devotions, Bible reading and prayer. Remember, where God is present, home is church, too!
- FAITH5—Gather in person with at least one other person to share your highs and lows, read a Bible passage, talk about faith, pray for each other's highs and lows, and then bless each other. Simple but powerful!
- ♦ Pandemic Pen & Prayer Pals—Pair up with someone else in the congregation and sent notes back and forth encouraging each other during this challenging time. This is a wonderful cross-generational activity, with older adults and children writing each other. Think of someone who could use a prayer pal!
- Gratitude Chain—Remember those paper chains you made in school? Each day write at least one thing you are grateful for on a strip of paper and create a gratitude chain to remind you of God's blessings.
- ◆ Painted Prayer Rocks—Take a smooth rock and write (paint pen works best) a Bible verse, prayer, or message of hope and encouragement on it (something like, "God loves you", "Keep calm and trust God", "Don't be afraid—God's got this"). Place the rock in a public place for someone to find. It will make their day!



From the Desk of Deacon Andrew



"Let's read our Bibles and learn more about God's word together! Spend time this month with



2 Corinthians

• Length: 13 chapters

• Author: This is one of the seven undisputed letters by the Apostle Paul

• Recipients: The church at Corinth, the capitol city of the Roman province of Achaia. Paul himself founded the Christian church in Corinth during his missionary journeys. According to Acts 18:1-11, Paul stayed at Corinth for a year and a half after he started the new Christian church there.

• Remember as we read Paul's letters, we are literally reading 1st century mail between an individual and a Christian community.

- Even though it is referred to as 2 Corinthians, many scholars believe that this writing was not originally a single letter, but rather a compilation of several letters between Paul and the church in Corinth.
- Paul's relationship with the church in Corinth had apparently deteriorated during the time after 1 Corinthians was written. It seems that during Paul's second visit to the church in Corinth, something had occurred that caused some strain in his relationship with them. The visit then that was announced back in 1 Cor. 16:5-7 did not happen as planned, and it seems that the Corinthians felt that Paul had vacillated in his plans (2 Cor. 1:15-23). Much of this letter deals with the crisis in confidence between Paul and the Corinthian community.
- Paul was concerned that making another visit to Corinth in person might make the situation worse (2:1). Instead of going to them in person, Paul wrote a rather severe letter written "out of much distress and anguish of heart and with many tears" (2:4). This letter, delivered by Titus, is now lost to us (although some scholars believe that chapters 10-13 may actually include parts of this "severe" letter). Paul was so worried about the effects of this letter (7:8) that he decided to go to Corinth before receiving their reply. On his way to them he met Titus, who delivered a reassuring report from the Corinthian church (7:13). Out of gratitude and in preparation for his third visit to Corinth, Paul wrote the letter we have before us.
- This letter can be broken into several broad sections:
 - <u>Chapters 1 7:</u> Paul defends his ministry against charges that he is bold when writing letters, but weak when speaking face to face. He makes it clear that his boldness and boasting come only from his faith in Jesus Christ, not from self-conceit.
 - <u>Chapters 8 & 9</u> concern the topic of the collection for the Christian church in Jerusalem. Paul appeals to the example of Jesus who was willing to sacrifice for the sake of others.
 - <u>Chapters 10-13</u> are a vigorous defense of Paul's ministry against the "super apostles", rival missionaries who have impressed the Corinthian Christians and are critical of Paul.
- Because so much of 2 Corinthians is written as a response to the words and feelings between Paul and the church in Corinth which are not recorded in this letter, it is sometimes difficult to follow Paul's arguments. What it does reveal to us is the complicated and sometimes messy reality of ministry in the infant first century church, as well as Paul's deep concern for the churches he established.

From the Castle

Luther: 1st Living Best Selling Author

During the Medieval ages, university professors of Theology, Law, Medicine and the Arts were required to post theses in prominent places on subject matter for their students who would debate or defend these statements in order to obtain their degrees.

Martin Luther's 95 Theses, nailed to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg in October of 1517, were actually written in Latin, a language unfamiliar to most people. When asked if Luther wanted these to be published, he declined saying they would be too confusing for the common citizenry. However, scholars immediately began to write to each other discussing Luther's points and forwarding them to others. They were not actually translated into German until the spring of 1518.




The idea for these 95 theses began as a sermon delivered by Martin Luther on January 16, 1517 entitled "Disputation for Clarifying the Power of Indulgences" in which he expressed concern about the selling of indulgences by the Catholic Church as a means of forgiving sins and became the framework of what is called the Lutheran Reformation. Remember, at this time, Luther was Catholic. When people went to the priest for confession (either personal or communal), the priest would offer to lessen or even remove their sin by doing some really good deed or paying a large 'donation', or indulgence, to the church. The church was indulging the sinner. Luther felt that in paying indulgences, remorse for one's sins was removed from the process. Luther himself, struggled with sin. In fact, he wanted to confess his sins so often that priests would often turn around and go the other way to avoid having to listen to his very long list.

What did get the attention was a sermon given in the spring of 1518 and sent to the Archbishop entitled "Indulgences and Grace"! It was only 20 paragraphs, which was quite short for Luther's sermons. Notes from this sermon were copied on the Gutenberg printing press and distributed throughout Germany and the surrounding countryside, making Martin Luther the first living best-selling author...and the founder of the Lutheran Church.
