Regathering for Worship in April

April is here! We are a year into the changing pandemic times and approaching our second Holy Week in this strange setting.

The good news is that our covid case count has come down from the 15% hospitalization rate in the region for over a month which means we can begin the next leg in our in-person regathering as a faith



community. The bad news is that because our church building is under renovation, we don't have access to it.

Therefore, beginning April 4th, Easter Sunday, we will host worship on the outside lawn of Peace Lutheran Church AND livestream. Although Easter will include a pre-recorded worship in addition to the outside in-person option, we will begin worshipping outside at **10am each Sunday** livestreaming the outdoor, in-person worship.

Bring your own lawn chair for Easter service or tune in like normal logging into the <u>Peace Facebook Page</u> or <u>https://www.peacenb.org/live</u>. For those without chairs, we'll have some handy and spread out. Masks are still required for in-person activities. For the outdoor worship after Easter, you do not need to bring chairs. These worship services will be in the back parking lot.

Note: <u>for any inclement weather, the outdoor service will be automatically canceled, and an in-door livestreaming worship will commence with a handful of worship leaders.</u>

This will be our practice until the building is ready to use once again.

The 8am Parking Lot worship continues for folks to gather in their cars. The only Sunday we are not having the 8am parking lot is April 4th. The Parking Lot worship will NOT be canceled for inclement weather.



Foot Washing...the 3rd Sacrament? Diakonia

Before you start calling me a heretic...consider this. In a book entitled Wilhelm

Loehe and North America, by the

Rev. Dr. Craig Nessan, Academic Dean of Wartburg Theological Seminary, the author states, "Jesus Christ is a diaconal minister. One of the most apt and accurate descriptions of the ministry of Jesus Christ is the ministry of Word and Service. From many angles the New Testament testifies to the servanthood of Jesus."



Jesus came to serve others. In John 13:12-17, we read a description of his tender act of

washing the disciples' feet. Jesus invites his followers to ministry by washing each other's feet. The basin and towel are signs of Word and Service, the ministry of a Deacon.

Jesus continually sought out and raised up those forgotten, written off, oppressed people, existing on the margins of society and connected them to God's promises. Jesus identified and satisfied those in need. This too, is an attribute of diaconal ministry... connecting the world to Christ and Christ to the world.

Professor Nessan goes on to say, "As the New Testament makes clear, Word and Service ministry is not only the ministry of Jesus Christ, it is the ministry Jesus Christ entrusts to the whole church."

According to Lutheran theology, a sacrament is ordained by God, whereby the treasures of the Gospel (forgiveness, eternal life, salvation) are offered in a visible created means. Jesus himself, washed others feet, in service to all, through the use of created means (water, bowl, and pitcher). Imagine how this attitude of servanthood would change 'the church' and its ministry if foot washing was raised to the level of a sacrament!

Important Information

Building Update - Progress Report on Water Damage

Over the past 5 weeks, Servpro has been hard at work removing all the damaged drywall and exterior wall insulation throughout the entire facility, 12" off the floor. In addition, all lower cabinets were removed due to the wood swelling from standing water. We also had to tear up the sound booth and the riser for the altar to access the sheetrock. Because the water was standing throughout the building, it caused many of the floor tiles to start to buckle. The water that was expelled from the fire suppression system was classified as a level 3 contaminate. This is a very serious classification and helped justify the removal of all the flooring. The water had been stagnant within the piping for 30 years.

We were very fortunate that none of our electronics were damaged, including the organ and piano. Because our sanctuary chairs were solid hardwood, they will be cleaned and disinfected once all the construction is complete. Right now, the entire contents of the facility have been wrapped, boxed, and are being moved into 2-40' storage units that have been placed in our parking lot.

We are working very closely with a general contractor and the insurance adjuster. Our hope is that we are only a few days away from being able to start reconstruction. All the flooring will be replaced, new carpeting installed on the altar riser, and all the rooms will be painted once the sheetrock has been replaced. We will be expanding the

cabinetry in the fellowship hall, replacing all the kitchen, classroom, and sacristy cabinets to match, as well as looking into adding shower facilities in the back restrooms.

We have some minor electrical work that is outside the scope of the insurance claim. However, all the lighting fixtures will be upgraded to LED as most of the fixtures will be replaced as the humidity damaged the ballasts in most of the lights and caused several of the breakers to weaken.

Although a timeline has not yet been finalized, I estimate that it will take at least 2 months or more to complete all the work. More updates to follow...

Deacon Andrew's Bible Study Toolbox



How Lutherans Interpret the Bible Series



If there were bumper stickers back in Martin Luther's day (maybe to place on your family wagon), one of those would likely have been the Latin phrase "sola scriptura", which means "by scripture alone." But what exactly does that phrase mean, and why was this such a big deal to Luther, and to us as Lutheran Christians?



Martin Luther believed that Christian church's teaching, proclamation, and doctrine be grounded firstly and ultimately in the Bible. Luther was suspect or even critical whenever he sensed that this was not the case in church teaching or practice. For Luther, everything was subordinate to the Word of God, found in the Bible. This included the historical church councils, confessional writings, doctrines, practices of the church, and certainly papal/church authority. Luther believed that **scripture alone** was the sole authority for Christian faith and practice, and the only source and norm by which church doctrines were to be established and evaluated. Luther's outspoken and unwavering insistence on this belief was at odds with Rome, resulting in his eventual trial and excommunication from the Roman Catholic church in 1521.

So does this mean that Lutherans only believe things that are found in the Bible? No, that would be going way too far! There are a great many things that we know to be true that are not found in the Bible (science, mathematics, history, geography, etc). We acknowledge that the Bible is not primarily concerned with such things.

Secular or pagan philosophers say that there are two primary sources of truth:

- 1. **Human experience**—we know a thing to be true because our observations and experiences teach us that it is.
- 2. **Reason**—we know a thing to be true because it is logical and rational.


As Christians, we say there is more. We respect the validity of sound reason and the legitimacy of human experience. However, we also believe that are things in life beyond human experience and reason, and that there is a third source of ultimate truth:

3. **Divine Revelation**—we know a thing to be true because God has revealed it to be so.

Consider the following illustration of a three legged stool representing TRUTH:

Lutherans say that it is **the Bible alone** (not popes or church councils or doctrines or traditions or church practices or teachings or any other writings) that has **unique authority** as the only source for knowing divine truth that God reveals to us.

That is what is meant by the phrase, "sola scriptura".

April's Bible Books





1st, 2nd, & 3rd John

The letters of 1-3 John are three distinct writings that have been grouped together in our Bible due to early church tradition that they were all written by the author of the fourth gospel. All three writings indicate that there is conflict within the church community, though the conflict is different (although perhaps related) in each.

Some interesting aspects of 1st, 2nd & 3rd John:

- Length: 1 John is five chapters, but both 2 John and 3 John are a single page (one chapter) each. They are the two shortest "books" in our Bible and are classic examples of ancient Greco-Roman letters. 1 John, which does not have the same epistolary structure of 2 and 3 John, is less like a letter and more like a sermon exhorting the hearers to remain faithful to the teachings in which they have been instructed.
- Authorship: Most modern scholars conclude that they were written by either one or two people who belonged to the Johannine community of early Christian churches, but not necessarily by the writer of the fourth gospel. Both 2 John and 3 John are written by someone who refers to himself as "the elder".
- Date: Some time after the writing of the Gospel of John, towards the end of the 1st century CE.
- In 2 John, the "elect lady" (v.1) and the "elect sister" (v.13) are likely honorific titles for two of the Johannine congregations, rather than referring to specific individuals.
- 2 John is written for a collective audience of hearers, whereas 3 John appears to be written as a personal letter to someone referred to as "Gaius". The names Gaius, Demetrius, and Diotrephes make it clear that there were gentiles (majority?) within the Johannine community.
- 1 John addresses a serious schism from within the Johannine community which threatens the orthodoxy of its teachings and the integrity of its membership. Some members have already departed (2:19), and so the writing focuses on encouraging those who remain to strengthen their faith in God and their relationships with each other.
- Clearly, many themes of the Gospel of John are reflected in these three letters:
 - ⇒ Distinctions between light and darkness, truth and falsehood, the community and the "world", life and death
 - ⇒ The pre-existence of Jesus from "the beginning"
 - ⇒ Believers in Jesus being born "from God" / "from above"
 - ⇒ The importance of abiding in God's / Jesus' love
 - ⇒ Having love for one another, caring for one another, praying for one another as an imitation of the unity found in God ("Beloved, if God so loved us, so we also ought to love one another").

Beloved, let us love one another,
for love is from God,
and whoever loves has been born of God
and knows God.

A Letter From Serve Spot

Dear Peace Lutheran,

I love that God brings beauty from ashes and good from pain and sorrow. The last 12 months have been a year of loss and change and sorrow. When we think it can't get any worse, we learned to bite our tongues as we learned that it could get worse. I can only imagine many of you have lost health, friendships, "normalcy", and possibly even loved ones due to the pandemic and its major tsunami effects on the life of our world. I am so sorry to hear about your water damage to the church building.



I want to bring you some good news that has come out of 2020 due to God's working in our community and through your generosity!

Last summer, the Peace Lutheran Endowment Committee selected Serve Spot as your grant recipient. That gift toward marketing our website (www.servespot.org) has snowballed into blessings for so many in our community. Your confidence in this site and the vision Serve Spot has for New Braunfels launched us into a jaw dropping season of awe as we watch the Lord at work. Let me tell you a few stories...

First, we launched Serve Spot to New Braunfels in October 2020. Then you supplied funds for us to create a **2 minute video** to educate our community on our goals and services. "What is Serve Spot?" can be found on our main page www.servespot.org. This has been very helpful in communicating the purpose of the site and how it can help our community.

First Footing Shelter Partner Congregations: The Serve Spot team learned that the First Footing Shelter had all of the moving parts needed to launch in early 2021 except financial support. We informed the "Big C" Church of New Braunfels of the need and built a team of 10 congregations (yours included) who financially support the shelter (\$75,000 and counting!) and are hands on helpers with immediate needs of shelter guests (think breakfasts, boots for a new job, fostering a homeless guest's dog, etc.). The shelter saved lives during "Snowpocolypse" giving shelter to those who did not have protection.

Boosting the work of our area nonprofits:

- Our local foster/adoption support nonprofit CEO Jenni Lord of Chosen, was featured on a podcast and received a \$25,000 grant through Serve Spot connections. Listen to this podcast here: https://legacycollective.libsyn.com/chosen. We nominated another nonprofit for a similar grant through Legacy Collective and will continue to do so with area nonprofits.
- We have been meeting with multiple **nonprofits**, connecting them to one another with resources, ideas, and using one another so they don't need to "reinvent the wheel". Meals are being provided, speakers to educate one another's volunteers, and marketing are all being shared through these connections.
- Our **Facebook** ads (thanks to your funding) have been seen by over 20,000 people in the last 4 months.
- Our **website** that includes a directory of care and volunteer portal has seen a continued increase in views each month due to marketing. We're seeing over 400 visitors per month.

National Impact: Serve Spot is on a team of 90+ cities across the country who are working on loving our cities well. New Braunfels is not alone in our dream to unite and serve our neighbors more effectively! New Braunfels is to be featured in a book about cities coming together in unity to love and serve their neighbors this year through this organization, Love Our Cities (book with same name).
