Even though the sanctuary won't be fully completed, we will set up chairs and break down the space for work to continue throughout the week. However, we'll be able to worship


in the comfort of air conditioning out of the summer heat.

#### A Message from the Pastor

#### **Incarnational Regathering**

<sup>1</sup>In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God and the Word was God.

14 The Word became flesh and made his home among us.
We have seen his glory, glory like that of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

John 1:1, 14

As I write this article the building is moving closer to final stages of reconstruction. My hope is that on July 4th we will move into the building and resume in-person worship. Continue to stay tuned in as we finalize these plans.

The summer schedule and the soft relaunching of our gathered community seems appropriate to offer one worship service at 10:00 am. This enables us to focus our efforts on that time together and rebuild a sense of in-person community.

While I am grateful for our online presence and encourage you to utilize that arena, I know there is a key piece missing of the incarnational regathering – that is, the body of Christ being fully present.

Incarnation is this wonderful theological point that the Word of God becomes flesh. It's the recognition that God is with us in the real stuff of life.

Some key things that this time away has taught me:

- Being fully engaged in a mind, body, and spirit endeavor. I love talking to my friends and family over the phone when we can't be in close proximity, but there's something deeper about being there and sharing an experience fully embodied. Screens have been a useful tool, but just as God became fully human incarnated in Jesus, we are an incarnational people meant to live in deep, meaningful relationships. How much did we miss seeing our own extended families and rejoiced at the opportunity for that first hug? We get to do this again with our church family!
- **Hybrid church** is living in the online and in-person community. Online community is here to stay. Our lives were busy before the pandemic. Conflicting schedules and finding the "right" time has become increasingly challenging. The pandemic forced us to adapt to meet people in their homes. We will continue to meet people both in-person and online because we spend much of our lives in both domains. It's not an either/or, rather a both/and for the gospel to be shared.



• The church is the people. If church is designed as solely a Sunday morning experience, then the pandemic and building flooding effectively killed the church. After all, if you can't "get to church" then it's dead. However, as the famous children's song puts it:

The church is not a building; the church is not a steeple; the church is not a resting place; the church is a people. I am the church! You are the church! We are the church together!
All who follow Jesus, all around the world!
Yes, we're the church together!

Our building is a wonderful resource of community space, but the church has and will always be the people of God working to advance God's mission of faith, hope, and love to the world.


#### Are you ready to be a part of our Prayer Ministry? Look at your options.


- \*We have a Prayer Chain that has 28 people ready to pray for or with you.

## A Message from the Deacon





#### The Gospel of John

The Gospel of John gives us a beautiful glimpse into the mystery of the person of Jesus, his eternal origin and divine nature. This gospel differs from the other three gospels in the Bible (often referred to as the "Synoptic Gospels") of Matthew, Mark and Luke in style, order, and content, both in what it contains, as well as what it doesn't contain. It does not differ, however, in presenting Jesus as the Son of God, the crucified and exalted savior of humanity, through whose innocent self-giving death the power of sin, death, and the devil are destroyed.

#### Some interesting aspects of the Gospel of John:

- Length: Twenty-one chapters.
- Authorship: Popular tradition assigns the authorship of this gospel to John, son of Zebedee and brother of James, one of Jesus' original twelve disciples. It is also possible that the Gospel of John went through a series of stages of composition and editing, by the hands of several authors from the Johannine community.
- John's gospel claims to be based on the testimony of someone referred to as "the beloved disciple" (21:23-24), who we meet several times throughout the text (chapters 13, 18, 19, 20, and 21).
- Date: John is believed to be the last of the four gospels, written some time at the end of the first century.
- John's gospel begins with a hymnic prologue that presents Jesus as the pre-existent Word made flesh, and makes clear that Jesus was not simply with God, but that Jesus IS God. (John 1:1-18). John's gospel therefore provides the foundation for the doctrine of incarnation, that, in the person of Jesus, God became human.
- Scholars estimate that about 90% of the material in John's gospel is unparalleled in Matthew, Mark or Luke
- It is only in John's gospel that we find the stories of the wedding at Cana, Jesus' conversations with Nicodemus and also the woman at the well, the raising of Lazarus, Jesus' washing his disciples' feet, and Jesus' post resurrection appearance to his disciples by the shore of a lake as they were fishing.

• In John, there is no story of Jesus' birth, no parables, no accounts of Jesus casting out demons, no account of the transfiguration, and no record of the Jesus' institution of the Eucharist.

• It is from the Gospel of John that we get the clearest understanding that Jesus' public ministry lasted approximately three years (describes three different

annual Passover celebrations)

• Like Luke, John gives particular attention to women characters (Mary Magdalene, the Samaritan woman, Mary and Martha, Lazarus' sisters, among others)

- There are several notable "I Am" sayings of Jesus which use symbolic imagery: Jesus says, "I Am...the bread of life" (6:35), "the light of the world" (8:12; 9:5), "the gate" (10:7,9), "the good shepherd (10:11,14), "the resurrection and the life" (11:25), "the way the truth and the life" (14:6), "the vine" (15:1,5)
- In John, Jesus' miracles are referred to as "signs" which serve to reinforce Jesus' teaching and reveal Jesus' glory. John makes clear that Jesus did many other signs that were not written in this book.
- The Gospel of John states the purpose of its composition, that it was "written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name".

#### From the Castle


**Liturgy** is the customary public worship performed by a religious group. As a religious phenomenon, **liturgy** represents a communal response to and participation in the sacred through activities reflecting praise, thanksgiving, remembrance, supplication or repentance.

In the Lutheran Church, liturgy then is the work of the people. The assembly of worshippers who sing parts of the service, respond vocally with the minister, deacon or worship assistant, and participate in the fullness of the service.

One of the changes that Martin Luther brought to the church in 1517 was the responsibility or duty of the assembly to take an active role in the order of worship. Prior to Luther, only the Priest or the Cantor (singer) would have a voice in the service. The assembly or congregation was only allowed to listen passively.


Our cranberry hymnal, Evangelical Lutheran Worship (ELW) has ten settings (or musical arrangements) in numerous styles. Our newest hymnal supplement, All Creation Sings (ACS), has added two additional musical arrangements...one in Spanish and one in English. These are our primary resources for liturgies, prayers and music.

Lutheran worship follows a pattern in all its worship services: **The Gathering** (usually a song and/or Forgiveness and Absolution; **The Word** (scripture

- It's all about discipleship. Again, if church stopped this past year, it's time to examine the discipleship question of how are we called to grow closer to God's heart in a multitude of ways: prayer, study, worship, service, giving, encouragement. A disciple is one who follows Jesus and is actively walking with the Lord especially in the storms of life. The antidote to adversity is not hunkering down and weathering the storm it's following Jesus into the storm and trusting he has the power over even the wind and the rain.
- Focus on what matters. Trying to find the bandwidth to stay afloat was challenging to say the least. The church had to cut back on a lot of things in order to navigate the shifting landscape. We discovered there were plenty of things that we spent a lot of time on, that weren't essential. My guess is in your life, you experienced that in some fashion. In order to be the church in the 21<sup>st</sup> century we don't have to pretend we are good at everything. The entertainment industry does a better job of entertainment (although you can find joy as church); the movie business makes higher quality movies (although we became amateur cinematographers); many nonprofits do are better equipped to serve (although our sacred partnerships enable us to serve together). But what we do as the church that nobody as else can imitate is foster a beloved community grounded in the good news of Christ seeking to share that gift of God's unconditional love.

The reality is that the church has gone through all kinds of shifts throughout its long history, but the constant has been that God's reconciling love through Jesus Christ remains.

I'm looking forward to seeing us together again, incarnating the love of God face to face once again. But I'm also looking for the transformation of becoming deeper followers of the way of Jesus and that happens when we find ourselves in the crucible of life.

#### **Despair**

Despair or disappointment can occur for any number of reasons. Do you ever have those moments when you realize that you are not feeling just right? Maybe you are



anticipating some news and you are not sure if it will be good or bad. The anticipation of news can be overwhelming at times, especially when you feel that your world has turned upside-down, and you are just being overwhelmed by gloom and darkness. How do you get ready to face another challenge when the door keeps closing on you.

From "Facing the Darkness", in Our Daily Bread, (May 18, 2021) the people of God found themselves in the darkness of impending exile. They waited, unsure of what would take place. The profit Isaiah

used darkness as a metaphor for their disorientation and as a way of speaking about God's judgment. But a light would come. "The people walking in darkness have seen a great light. In the land of deep darkness, a light has dawned" (Isaiah 9:2).

From "Got Plans", in Our Daily bread, (May 24, 2021) dreams that don't come to fruition can bring disappointment, but our limited vision for the future can never compete with God's all-knowing ways. As we yield ourselves to Him, we can be certain that He's still lovingly directing our steps even when we don't see the path ahead.
