New Covid Guidelines

August was a challenging month for our society. We experienced yet another surge of the coronavirus flooding our hospitals and medical personnel once again.

We pray for the health of all people, particularly in this precarious time.

Having been through these trying times before, We were hoping we had moved beyond this. But life is full of ups and downs, and part of our walk as Christians is to navigate the shifting landscape and keep walking in the footsteps of Jesus who is always on a mission to heal and reconcile the world.

In response to these rising cases, our safety protocols dictated we suspend in-person activity after a 15% threshold of covid capacity in our hospital region.

With a chance to pause, our Covid Task Force and Church Council re-evaluated our 2020 guidelines and updated new guidelines commensurate with the new realities.

Here are the new guidelines:



St. Paul's Is A
Book of Faith Congregation
"Rooted In God's Word"

Colossians

Some interesting aspects of Colossians:

- Length: Four chapters
- Author: Although the salutation of this writing indicates it is from the apostle Paul (1:1a) and Timothy (1:1b), many biblical scholars think that this writing was actually made by the hand of a second generation Christian from a church community established by Paul, rather than by the apostle himself. As such, Colossians is sometimes put into a category of writings in the NT referred to as "deutero-Pauline". This distinction does not lessen in any way the validity, canonicity, authority or value of these writings for Christians and for the Christian church. It simply reflects the development of the early church and its interpretation and expression of the faith.
- Interestingly, Colossians is a literary sibling of the letter of Ephesians. Almost one-third of Colossians appears in Ephesians, suggesting a direct literary dependence, where the author of Ephesians appears to have the letter to the Colossians in front of him as he is writing.
- Recipients: Colossae was located in Asia Minor, not far from Ephesus, about 125 miles inland from the Aegean Sea. The church in Colossae was probably founded by Epaphras (1:7; 4:12)
- Colossians emphasizes the important role Jesus Christ plays in God's plan of salvation and how Christians are now fully united with Christ.
- The author is concerned about the danger of heresy being taught within the church by false teachers regarding special knowledge and strict ways of living needed in order to be fully united with Christ. as well as ethical matters of conduct.
- The letter can be divided into the following sections:
 - 1:1–1:2 Address, Salutation and Greetings
 - 1:3–1:8 Prayer of Thanks
 - 1:9—2:23 Theological Foundation for Ethics: The Supremacy of Christ
 - 3:1-4:9 The Right and Wrong of Christian Living
 - 4:10-18 Greetings and Conclusion
- The foundation of this letter's understanding of God and Jesus is found in 1:15-20, which is an early hymn celebrating who Jesus is and what God has done through Jesus. Here Christ is called the image of the invisible God, the one through whom God created everything, the one who holds the universe together, and the one whose death brings peace throughout the universe.
- Because Christians of all ages have already been united with Christ through baptism (2:11-15), we therefore let Christ's love, peace, and forgiveness guide our lives and our relationships with other Christians (3:1-5; 12-17), with members of our family (3:18-4:1), and with people who are not Christians (4:5-6)

"As you therefore have received Christ Jesus the Lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving." (Col. 2:6-7)

Deacon Andrew's Bible Study Toolbox

How Lutherans Interpret the Bible Series

Scripture In Light of Scripture



Consider the following questions. Have you ever found that, when reading or listening to a particularly difficult Bible passage, sometimes the words:

- ...are not immediately clear in their meaning?
- ...seem like they could have multiple meanings?
- ...seem like they mean different things to different people/groups?
- ...do not seem to fit exactly with other passages in the Bible?
- ...sound like they even contradict other passages in the Bible?

I know that my answer to all of these questions is "yes!" My guess is that all of us have encountered each of these "bumps in the road" as we read and listen to passages from the Bible. Don't fret! This is actually normal, common, and in some ways, even expected.

"Wait, Deacon Andrew! You mean the Bible is <u>supposed</u> to not make sense?"

Not exactly. It is true that we might (likely) encounter difficult Bible passages that confuse us. Sometimes this happens when we read or study the Bible on our own. Sometimes this happens when we are listening to a lesson or sermon in worship. Sometimes this happens when someone throws out a passage of scripture that does not make sense to us or does not match what we believe the Bible to say. This is where the tool of **USING SCRIPTURE TO INTERPRET SCRIPTURE** is particularly helpful. We can use this tool in three different ways.

Interpret difficult passages in light of more readily understandable ones.

This is like learning to swim. We enter a swimming pool from the shallow end instead of diving straight into the deep end. This helps us get used to the water without worrying about not being able to stay afloat. As we become more comfortable, we can venture into deeper water. Returning to where the water is waist high instead of over our head gives us a chance to relax and learn. Try to consider what is said in one part of scripture with what is said in other parts of scripture.

Avoid proof texting

Proof texting is lifting a passage of scripture out of its larger context in order to make a particular point or settle an argument. In doing this, other parts of scripture that might provide more insight into the topic at hand are ignored (often intentionally). If someone tries hard enough, using proof texts allows that person (or group of people) to make the Bible say almost anything they want it to. Using scripture to interpret scripture helps us to be faithful to the entire Bible rather than just picking some parts and leaving others alone.

• Interpret difficult passages in light of the broader message of the whole Bible.

Remember, the Bible is a complex and amazing collection of writings. No passage of scripture exists in a vacuum. Every word, verse, and chapter in every book of the Bible are part of a much larger message of the whole Bible. Sometimes there is tension and even seeming contradiction between Bible passages that say different things. By taking the "broad view" of the Bible, we look for its major themes, what we might call "the heart of scripture". We can then examine individual passages more carefully, realizing that some passages of scripture are more important than others, and that understanding the whole is necessary for faithful interpretation of its parts.

Normal

How often have we said in the past year when are we going to get back to normal? Normal is an arbitrary time set when life



appears stable. Not changing every month or for that matter every week. Life has been continually evolving, with wars, economic crises or pandemics (measles, polio, variants of the flu, AIDs and Covid), as well as changes in transportation, communication and shopping. So what is normal? I would venture that it is an event that is not different from what we have been experiencing. These drastic changes in life style, keeping to ourselves, wearing a mask, not attending a Sunday service in a church building. Not eating in a restaurant, not going to school or work, but attending virtually. All this and more can affect us, some us more than others.

From our daily bread July 1; "Not Rushing Prayer", The Hawaiian people would sit outside their temples for a lengthy amount of time, preparing themselves before entering in. Even after entering they would creep to the altar to offer their prayers. Afterward they would sit outside again for a long time to "breath life" into their prayers. When the missionaries came to the island, the Hawaiians would sometimes consider their prayers odd. They were rushed, different from theirs, not normal. The Hawaiian felt that these were prayers "without breath."

I mention this to show what was acceptable or normal and different or not normal. That normal is a perception of social standards. Our lives are changing every day, sometimes very dramatic, sometimes we do not even notice the changes they are subtle.

The dramatic changes tend to linger on and cause more problems. Those who are experiencing difficulties with "normal", contact the church or a Stephen Minister. Building Renovation Update

Over the course of this past month, the building continues to be repaired and updates. The sanctuary has been completed including a new floor, paint job, and carpeting over the chancel area.

We switched our inside orientation from the sideview back to facing the cross and chancel.

Some electrical work was needed to restore power to our projectors. Within worship, we now have the full use of our media equipment.

The sound in the sanctuary has a significant reverberation due to the lack of padded absorption in the room. Our hope is that when the padded chairs are returned and banners hung, that will restore our sound quality again.

In addition to the sanctuary work, painting has been finished in the narthex. The narthex bathrooms have been retiled with a fresh new look.

New cabinets have been delivered and laid out throughout the building to go in the fellowship hall and various classrooms.

We suspect that much of the work will be accomplished in the final weeks of August and early September.

Movers are scheduled to begin unloading the pods storing the church's "stuff" on September 9th.

Our building rededication is scheduled for worship on 9/12. Come celebrate the rebuilding of the church!
