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A Message from the Pastor

Goodbye Calendar

"For I know the plans I have for you, 'declares the Lord, 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you a hope and a future." — Jeremiah 29:11

I'm a planner. I like to know when things are going to happen and the steps in order to ensure they are implemented properly. Pastoring a church and having a family with four kids, I live by a calendar. If it doesn't get on the calendar, it typically doesn't get done. There's just too much to keep track of and without some reminder, I lose sight of things.



Then the pandemic struck. And every system in place was disrupted. People were suddenly not meeting anymore. Communication was different. The calendar looked wide open because of all the events that had been canceled. However, those days were fuller than ever.

Oh and when it finally felt like I was getting the hang of learning all the online stuff, then the building flood happened during the winter freeze. That calendar looked wide open again, but it was filling up with more and emergency, survival maneuvers.

This past year, I did a lot of soul-searching. How can we project and plan for things in the future when tomorrow is more and more uncertain?

Sometimes I hear people reference that quote from Jeremiah that talks about prospering people and the big plans God has for our individual lives. But Jeremiah writes in the time of the greatest dislocation of Israel in the Bible – when their lands had been invaded and the people imprisoned and exiled.



I'm sure they had calendars full of hopes and dreams, but an external force came and cleared it all crushing their plans. But God reminded the people that despite the disruption, God had a future planned for them. It wasn't easy the years ahead, but it was filled with God's vision of hope for something more beautiful.

It's been a rough season for us. I've learned to stop relying so much on my own plans and to make sure there's always some room for God to speak and fill the calendar he has in store. I've surrendered the need to be in control, and I'm living into the reality that we trust in God's provision and direction; we walk together in faith in uncertain times; and we hope for what is unseen but what God reveals as his kingdom of love for all.





The Letter of James "Faith In Action"

Some interesting aspects of James:

- Length: Five chapters
- Author: Scholars are divided between crediting authorship to James the brother of Jesus, to another person named James, or to someone writing under the name of James (pseudonymous authorship).
- Date: Unknown, possibly as early as 50 C.E., but also possibly quite late, largely depending on authorship.
- James does begin with a typical greeting of a letter of those days, but is addressed not to a specific person or congregation, but to "the twelve tribes in the Dispersion".
- Interestingly, James only mentions Jesus by name twice (1:1, 2:1).
- In both content and style, James reads more like a sermon or collection of wisdom sayings, full of exhortation admonishment, and advice. Some of the content does parallel the gospels, such as the Sermon on the Mount.
- An overarching them in James emphasizes that those who have faith need to manifest it in the way they live.

"but be doers of the word, and not merely hearers" (1:22)

• Luther referred to James as "an epistle of straw", because he thought it contradicted with Paul's teaching on faith and righteousness (see below) and because it did not have any gospel character—that is, showing forth Christ. Compare Galatians 2:1-14 with James 2:14:26, particularly:

"yet we know that a person is justified, not by the works of the law, but through faith in Jesus Christ" (Gal 2:16)

VS

"you see that a person is justified by works and not by faith alone." (James 2:24)

Notice that the words "justified", "faith", and "works" appears in both writings, and on face value might sound completely contradictory, as Luther concluded. However, through a deeper reading we can see that these words are likely being used quite differently by the two authors. Modern (including Lutheran) scholars have recognized and emphasized the importance of this distinction in faithfully reading and interpreting both Paul and James.

In Galatians, Paul's point is aimed at those who believe that justification, here meaning salvation, can and must be obtained through doctrinal correctness and compulsive religious observances, including all requirements of the Torah. Paul's argument is that our salvation comes from God alone through what Jesus Christ has done, not by anything that we ourselves do. James would certainly agree.

For James, his emphasis on works refers to those ways that we demonstrate our faith in active lives of service to others, and in witness to the gospel. Our faith can and must compel us to see beyond ourselves and look toward the needs of others and put our faith into practice. Works do not replace faith, but rather they complete it. Paul, later in Galatians, agrees when he writes,

"the only thing that counts is faith working through love" (Gal 5:6)

Deacon Andrew's Bible Study Toolbox



How Lutherans Interpret the Bible Series Scriptural Priority

Put simply, scriptural priority means that some things in the Bible are more important than others.

At first glance, people can be a bit shocked with this sentence. It upsets our sense of the utmost importance and integrity of all of the Bible. How can any part of the

Bible be more important? Doesn't that mean that somethings therefore are less important?

".....but Deacon Andrew, ALL of the Bible is important!"

The Bible is a collection of writings which allows God to speak to us through human writers across the centuries, but the Bible is not a monolithic book. It has numerous writers, literary texture and variety, many cultural influences, and broad literary and historical contextual settings.

As Lutherans, we recognize and appreciate the beauty of the Bible's complexity, while at the same time recognizing that some writings convey the heart of the message of scripture, while others are more focused on smaller details that may have less implication for our 21st century lives.

ALL of scripture is the Word of God, but what the Bible says about loving one's neighbor is more important than what it says about the length of Noah's ark. What the Bible says about grace and justification by faith in Christ is more important than what it says about not eating foods sacrificed to idols from the marketplace.

For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith – and this not from yourselves, it is the gift of God – not by works, so that no one may boast.

• Cophesians 2:8-9

Jesus himself gives us principles for determining which matters are most important (e.g., Matt. 7:12; 22:37-40; 23:23) as does Paul (1 Cor. 15:3-4; Eph. 2:8-9) and other biblical writers (Ex. 20:1-17; Mic. 6:8; Heb. 6:1-2).

Deut. 6:4-9 is a perfect example of scriptural priority for us Christians:

⁴ Hear, O Israel: The LORD is our God, the LORD alone.⁵ You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might. ⁶ Keep these words that I am commanding you today in your heart. ⁷ Recite them to your children and talk about them when you are at home and when you are

away, when you lie down and when you rise. ⁸ Bind them as a sign on your hand, fix them as an emblem on your forehead, ⁹ and write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates.

Verse 4 gives us some contextual clues about this passage. This is Moses speaking to the Israelites, exhorting them to listen and hold fast to their faith in God. Even though we are not Israelites, we would agree with Moses wholeheartedly! Verse 5 is one of the most famous verses in all the Bible. When asked which is the greatest commandment, Jesus gives this verse as his response. Verses 6-7 encourage dearly holding on to these words, and the importance of passing down these words to our children, and teach them frequently in daily life. We would also agree with and aspire to living by these words.

Verses 8-9 are more specific to the actual faith practices of the Israelites, the Jews. These words are meant literally, and are taken as such by many modern Jews. They literally place these verses on their bodies (see: phylactery) and their doorposts (see: mezuzah). For us as Christians, verses 8-9 are not part of our daily faith practices, at least not literally. In this passage, our focus is on verses 5-7. They are the scriptural priority for us here.

What Is A "Pray Ground?"

If you've been to in-person worship anytime over the last several months, whether our outdoor worship services on the front lawn or our services back inside our sanctuary, you've likely noticed that we have created some special space for our young children and families. We call this space our "Pray Ground". This type of space is becoming much more common in many churches as they recognize and respond to the need to invite children into a deeper and more meaningful engagement in worship. It is not meant to be a distraction from worship, but rather a



way to reinforce the pattern of worship and the weekly themes through the use of liturgical items (candles, crosses, seasonal colors, etc) alongside activities related to worship.

Another important aspect of our Pray Ground is that we have volunteers who sign up and are trained as "Shepherds" in order to give some hospitality, leadership, shape and consistency to our Pray Ground. Parents are not required to sit with their children, although they are welcome to. All our Pray Ground Shepherds go through our background check process as part of our child protection practices here at Peace.
