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A Message from the Pastor





I write this newsletter article in preparation for a pilgrimage 6500 miles away in Turkey and Greece walking in the footsteps of the Apostle Paul.

Like so many things that were delayed due to the pandemic, this trip was scheduled for April of 2020. 18 months later, I am finally enjoying the pilgrimage to these holy places.

Why do people go on pilgrimages? Each year millions of people go off to sacred sites seeking to be in communion with God. The Bible is chalk full of examples.

Furthermore, entering a new context allows one to see in a new way. Context is about immersing oneself in the where and why and to whom these scriptures were written so that one can have a deeper understanding of the power of the gospel spoken to real people with real struggles.

My hope is that at each site I will live and breathe the context of the places where Paul was writing to the nascent church and walk away with a immersive experience in which Scripture comes alive and God speaks to the deep places of my heart.

Just as we have experienced significant challenges these past couple of years, the churches Paul wrote to struggled with all kinds of issues.

In the church we talk a lot about baptism. The word literally means "to immerse" (presumably in water). When that person is immersed in the water and the gospel promise is spoken in which God says you are mine, that sacrament shares the very means of grace. This is why immersion trips are so important. It allows one to get away from the regular waters we swim in and become immersed in a new context.

I hope that even though many things have been put on the backburner and delayed these past 18 months, you might consider an immersion experience to reclaim your immersive baptism. Get out of the rut and go to a holy place so that you too might be renewed in Spirit.

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

A Message from the Deacon

Confirmation Corner



During the pandemic, Peace and St. Andrew both worked to adapt our ministries to the ever-changing conditions around us. One of the ministries that looked quite different during this time has been our confirmation ministry. With Peace and St. Andrew partnering together for this and many other shared ministries, we had to get creative!

As part of our adaptation, last year our combined confirmation group met twice a month on Sunday evenings for an hour via Zoom. Meeting virtually allowed

Pastor Jake, Pastor Paul and I to spend regular time with our youth around meaningful faith conversations. Although not ideal, we had great participation from our youth and their families, even as we recognized the limitations of this less-than-ideal format for sharing and growing in our faith together. We were (and continue to be) very grateful that technology provided a way for us to still meet together. Without the means to do meet together online, many of our ministries, including confirmation, would simply have been forced to take a temporary hiatus.

With the gradual return to in-person activities, Pastor Paul, Pastor Jake and I recognized that the world in which we find ourselves looks different in many ways than it did before the pandemic. This shifting reality applies to our confirmation ministry as well, so we have pivoted to a new model which we believe will best serve our youth, their families, and our congregations.

For this current year, we have moved to a retreat-based model, where we meet less often but for a longer length time together in order to allow for deeper and more meaningful learning. Our plan this year is to have quarterly retreats that vary in length from a single afternoon to an entire weekend. This accomplishes several things:

- It moves us from virtual to in-person gatherings
- It strengthens our ability to deepen our relationships with one another as a faith community
- It accommodates the busy schedules of our families
- It gives us more time to really dig into faith conversations
- It allows us to use many different types of learning, including music, art, games, and drama

On October 2nd, we held the first of these retreats at St. Andrew. Our retreat theme was **#blessed**. Our retreat focus was learning about the difference between our modern society's definition of what it means to be blessed versus what scripture and our faith tell us. Our retreat text was Jesus' "Sermon on the Mount" from Matthew 5. We learned that we are already blessed because of how God sees us, as beloved children, not based on other's opinions of us. Here's what they came up with:

- ⇒ We are blessed because we belong to God
- ⇒ We are blessed by God's amazing unshakable promises of life and love for us
- ⇒ We are blessed with all of the unique talents and gifts God gives to each of us
- ⇒ We are blessed by how we treat others with humility, kindness, & generosity
- ⇒ We are blessed regardless of how other people think of us, judge us, or treat us
- ⇒ We are blessed so that we may be a blessing to others



It is human nature not to like change. Changes can disrupt our daily activities. Interfering with our daily routine. They can disrupt our work, and interfere with our family and other relationships.

Our worlds are very complex. Changes can occur sporadically. They could be brief episodes or the changes can occur repeatedly over a longer period of time. Sometimes they can result in multiple changes, which can be very disruptive.
