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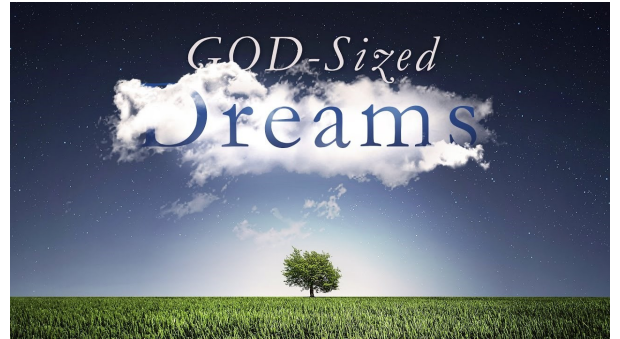


A Message from the Pastor

Dare to Dream

How many times have you heard yourself saying, “Someday I’m going to…”? Fill in the blank.

Sound familiar? I believe that “someday” is the enemy of the gift of today. “Someday” is daydreaming. Daydreaming is zoning out and passing the time. God-dreaming means putting seeing what God sees and putting feet to faith.



In the Bible we see people dreaming. Sometimes they are strange images that take some real help interpreting. But have you ever noticed some of the greatest messages are revealed in dreams? The angel of God announces news to Joseph and the magi in their dreams in the Christmas story. The Apostle Peter receives a new vision of Gentiles being included in the church in a dream. Daniel and Joseph in the Old Testament receive messages of hope and deliverance in their dreams.

This Lent we are planning a series called Dare to Dream. Too often we limit ourselves to daydreaming in our world, zoning out instead of zoning in on God’s dream for this world.

In this series my hope is that we can learn again to be dreamers, but not just with our head in the clouds—rather with our eyes scouring the horizon for God’s wondrous activity in this world. This begins with prayer.

I would ask that you begin praying this year to open your eyes to God’s dream. What does that look like? The cool thing about prayer is that it’s not just something we lift up, rather it tunes us in to what our hearts desire. And when our hearts are focused on God’s dream, we begin to see God at work already. Now, we can join in that work in a clearly way.

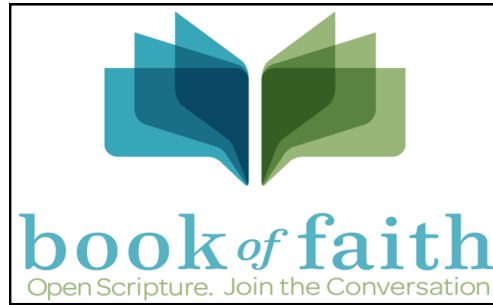
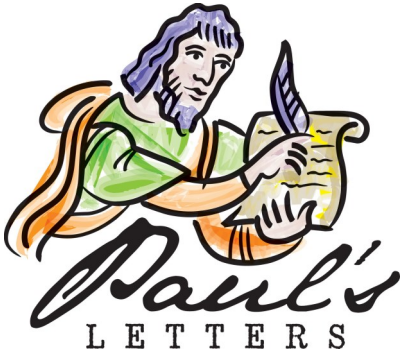

Bible Book of the Month



Growing in God's Word together!

1 Corinthians

- **Length:** 16 chapters (take two days to read each chapter, or read it through twice!)
- **Author:** This is one of the seven undisputed letters by the Apostle Paul
- **Recipients:** The church at Corinth, the capitol city of the Roman province of Achaia. Paul himself founded the Christian church in Corinth during his missionary journeys. According to Acts 18:1-11, Paul stayed at Corinth for a year and a half after he started the new Christian church there.
- **Date:** Paul likely wrote this letter between 53-56 CE from the city of Ephesus (see 16:8). Remember as we read Paul's letters, we are literally reading 1st century mail between an individual and a community.
- Even though it is referred to as 1 Corinthians, this was actually not the first letter Paul wrote to the church in Corinth. There is evidence (see 5:9) of an earlier letter that Paul wrote to the Corinthian community, as well as him having previously received a letter (see 7:1) and oral communication (see 11:1, 16:17) from the Corinthian community. This back and forth communication between Paul and the congregation in Corinth continues through what we know as 2 Corinthians.
- This letter addresses several specific interpersonal, ethical and doctrinal problems that the Corinthian community was facing. Although Paul's writing here is to a specific congregation regarding these specific issues, this letter, like all others in our New Testament, has been lifted up by the church for its value to all Christian communities.
- This letter is one of our best first-hand looks into the day-to-day realities and struggles of the early church. In it we see confusion and conflict about the meaning of the gospel message between Corinthian members, such as:
 - ⇒ competing claims to wisdom, wealth, spiritual gifts, and power
 - ⇒ abuse of social status by some members of the church over one another
 - ⇒ disagreements about social practices and their ongoing relevance in light of the news of Christ's expected return (marriage, distinctions between men and women, lawsuits, eating meat sacrificed to idols, sexual immorality)
- After his usual introductory remarks (address, salutation, thanksgiving, see 1:1-9), Paul sets out the groundwork for "the message of the cross" (1:17-25) for dealing with divisions, disagreements, and disorders within the Corinthian community.
- In 1 Corinthians we have the only example describing the institution of the Lord's Supper outside of the gospels. (see 11:23-26).
- Paul uses the metaphor of the church being one body with many different and unique members, all with important gifts and functions (12:12-31), to help illustrate his message to the Corinthian congregation.
- Probably the most well known quote from one of Paul's letters, one which is often used in modern day marriage ceremonies is 1 Corinthians 13:1-13. However sentimental it sounds, Paul was not writing this as marital advice, but rather as advice for how all Christians should treat one another as brothers and sisters.
- Paul continues with comments about the meaning and significance of Christ's resurrection (chpt. 15) to help underscore his theological point to the Corinthian community. Although clearly frustrated, Paul appears to remain hopeful about the future of this fledgling Christian community and closes with final words of benediction.

Peace has been in discernment over how music ministry will continue to be vibrant and holy. In answer to prayers, we are grateful for Steven Robbins, who joins us in 2023 as our new, part-time Choir Director.

Steven holds a BA in music from Texas Lutheran University with the guitar as his principal instrument. He then studied vocal music at UTSA, where he was the assistant conductor of the UTSA Chorus. While at UTSA, Steven also sang with the San Antonio Symphony Mastersingers.

He is the proud dad of his 17 year old daughter Sarah and 15 year old son Samuel.

Church music has always been a calling for Steven. He has been choir director/music director at St. Paul Lutheran in New Braunfels, Rolling Oaks Christian Church in San Antonio and St. Andrew Lutheran in Startzville. He's been part time music staff at Zion Lutheran in Helotes and Emanuel's Lutheran in Seguin.

Steven has been an elementary music teacher in the public school system for the past 19 years. He currently teaches at Vogel Elementary School in Seguin ISD. In addition, he is a Master Teaching Artist in the American Eurhythmics Society. An honor that makes him one of ten people in the United States authorized to train and certify other music teachers in Eurhythmics through the American Eurhythmics Society. Eurhythmics is a music education approach that utilizes somatic movement to teach music originally created by Swiss music educator Emile Jaques-Dalcroze. Steven teaches workshops and trainings around the country. His upcoming workshops include teaching at Belmont University in Nashville, TN in January 2023 and Colorado State University in Ft. Collins, CO in June 2023.
