Summer Mission Trip By Deacon Andrew

Peace and St. Andrew are taking a road trip to North Carolina to participate in a mission trip to Lutheridge, a beautiful ELCA camp near Asheville, NC. We have 6 youth and 4 adults from the two congregations going on this trip, which is open to our senior high youth, and will travel from Sunday, July 23rd to Sunday, July 30th.

Why Lutheridge?

I spent 20 years serving in the South Carolina Synod, and Lutheridge is the closest ELCA camp, so I am very familiar with it. I've taken many groups of youth up to Lutheridge

for summer camp, confirmation, and other activities. I've also been there many times for congregation and synod retreats. The new director of Lutheridge, Pastor Drew Yoos, was in my youth group in the first congregation I served in South Carolina in the early 2000s. It was during a conversation with Pastor Drew that the invitation to participate in this trip came about.



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
A Message from the Pastor

Gathered and Scattered

This past month I gathered with 5 other cohorts of congregations in Corpus Christi (the name of the city means "Body of Christ" which was an added bonus) at Galilean Lutheran Church for a weekend retreat examining what it means to be the church.

In the gathering space, I noticed 3 tubes full of golf balls hanging from the ceiling. I wasn't sure if it was there for the upcoming VBS week as some kind of prop. But it certainly stood out. On closer inspection, the first of the three tubes had a green outline to it, the second had a red one along with a few other colors. And finally there was one brown golf ball at the very end.

What in the world was I staring at? So I asked and found out it symbolized the time we spend in the week. Each of the 168 golf balls represented one hour of time we have every week. One third of that time was to sleep; another major bulk to our work lives; and some other various times dedicated to recreation and other responsibilities. The final brown ball represented the one hour in worship that we have.



Interestingly, our whole conference was based on how we are church every moment of our lives. However, somewhere along the way we associated church with only the times that we gather.

If you do an internet search of "what is church", almost every picture would be of a church building. We know deep down inside that's not what church is, and yet it is so ingrained in our vocabulary that it undercuts the power of

church.

The goal is to recognize that sometimes we are the gathered expression of the church when we worship or have Bible studies or congregational service projects or other celebrations... But the reality is by far, most of the time we are the scattered church in the world.

How many times do you equate your ministry in daily life as sacred and commissioned work in the world?

- For parents raising their children and teaching them their Christian values
- For the worker punching in and making something that brings life to the world
- For the family member sitting in the hospital with their loved one

Notice that in each of these scenarios, there's no organized congregational program to ensure this happens. No, quite the contrary. It's the organic way in which we live out our baptismal promises:

- live among God's faithful people
- hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper
- proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed
- serve all people following the example of Jesus
- strive for justice and peace in all the earth

(Affirmation of Baptism, Evangelical Lutheran Worship, p. 236)

The first two baptismal promises focus on the gathered church. But even still, what would it mean if we recognized that God's faithful people are all throughout the world and we are connected to them. Seeing Christ face in the world means we can connect to the holiness of every day life.

Hearing God's word is through every conversation we have, and every meal we share is an encounter with Jesus.

Proclaiming is witnessing your faith. Think of a story specific to you in which you witnessed God's presence and shared that news in word of action. Until we can actually name stories and encounters living faithfully is only head knowledge, God as an idea, instead of a living way of life.

And of course serving all people and striving for peace and justice means that no matter where you are: at home, work, with family or friends or strangers, we are living out our faith and striving for God's dream of love shared in the world.

What if we could multiply ministry not by asking people to spend extra time in an age in which we are already overtaxed for time? What if we recognized that the 168 hours in our week are already being used for the glory of God and the sharing of his dream?

This month I encourage you to think about the way you spend your time. I'm not asking you to add anything. Rather, examine how God is at work in your daily life and how each moment is a gift meant to express God's purpose for you. Write down a couple stories. If you're really bold, share them with someone including me.

Dear Peace Family,

Were you aware that we have a group of dedicated women who meet once a week at the church to create quilts for various organizations? They are called the Peaceful Piecers and they have been quilting for as long as I can remember. They spend all year sewing and tacking quilts. Last year they made 703 quilts, that were donated locally and overseas.

Quilting is near and dear to my heart. I began quilting in 2004 when someone from church asked me if I wanted to learn. I didn't own a machine or even know how to sew, but I wanted to give it a try. Creating a quilt is a time-consuming process. There are several steps, and great thought must be given to each step. First, choose a pattern. Maybe you want to make a baby blanket, wall hanging, lap quilt, or bed cover. Once you



know the pattern, select the fabric. This is the step that takes the longest for me because there are so many choices. I can spend hours at the fabric shop searching for just the right colors, patterns, stripes, polka dots, etc. to fit the style and pattern of my quilt. The fabric is cut into the proper shapes and sizes, and then <u>lovingly</u> sewn together. I underline that word because there are times when I am ripping out a seam that I don't feel I am sewing with love. Once the quilt top is complete, it is layered with batting and a back like a sandwich. Now it is time to quilt your masterpiece. Many people still quilt by hand but I choose to take mine to a wonderful lady who quilts on a long arm sewing machine. Once quilted, it is returned to me. Binding is sewn on and then tacked down. A "handmade" label is attached to the back and your quilt project is now complete. Whew! I'm exhausted just thinking about it.

My thoughts drift to those wonderful ladies who meet every Tuesday to create quilts for Lutheran World Relief, the Crisis Center and New Life Children's Home. They go through each step—choosing the pattern, picking the fabric, sewing the pieces together, layering, and finally tacking them to form a unique and beautiful quilt. They are packed up and sent all over the

world (LWR), where they are used to keep someone warm, serve as a tarp for cover from the elements, or to comfort those who are ill. Those quilts that are donated locally are used to comfort a teenage girl from a broken home or a woman fleeing an abusive relationship. The Peaceful Piecers rely on donations to continue this blessed work. If you would like to help, they are in need of fabric, twin-size flat sheets or monetary gifts.

Stop and look at a quilt sometime. The construction of a quilt reminds me of God's people. Quilts are created with love just as God created man. Quilts are made with fabric of every color, shape, and size which, when sewn together, makes a beautiful keepsake. God created His children in the same manner. He is the stitching in our quilt which helps bring people together. Quilts sometimes have imperfections and when used frequently, become worn. Like quilts, we are imperfect because we sin. Prejudice, greed, hatred, and envy get in our way. As Christians, we should strive to love our brothers and sisters, whether they are different, tattered, or torn.

I think Mary Tatem said it best in her book, "*The Quilt of Life*", "When God formed us, He knew His wonderful plan for our lives. Even when we have messed up His plan, He continues to work His design in us and provide the stitches to hold us together."



Living Stones: A Pilgrimage to the Holy Land

Living Stones: A Pilgrimage to the Holy Land January 14-25, 2024

Join with Bishop Sue, Pastor Jake, and others from around the synod on our Living Stones Pilgrimage to the Holy Land. We will renew our baptismal vows in the Jordan River, explore holy sites, learn from local guides and leaders, and connect with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land.



Who: This trip is designed for anyone in the Southwestern Texas Synod. We are hoping for a good mix of lay and rostered ministers, younger and older, first-timers and repeat pilgrims from all over the synod.

What: Join with Bishop Sue, Pastor Jake, and others from around the synod on our pilgrimage to the Holy Land. We will renew our baptismal vows in the Jordan River, explore holy sites, learn from local guides and leaders, and connect with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land.

When: Participants will leave the United States on January 14 and leave from Tel Aviv on January 25. Two pre-meetings are required: August 20 and a date to be determined.

Where: We will visit a variety of sites on this trip, including the Jordan River, the Western Wall, local Lutheran churches, Gethsemane, and Emmaus. These important sites are not the only stones we will encounter, however. We will also spend time in worship, fellowship, and learning from our local guides and guest speakers on topics like Palestine, Israel, and Islam. This is not a tourist trip but an opportunity to deepen our faith and expand our worldview together.

At this point whether the meal providers will stay and dine is undetermined and the Family Promise staff suggested that in addition to providing a meal, there could be a Grub Hub or Uber Eats option for the tech savvy volunteers.
