The Art of Neighboring



Peace Lutheran Church has an active Prayer Ministry. We have an Email Prayer Chain, we have a Zoom "Sweet Hour





A Message from the Deacon



If you've even been on any kind of group mission trip, you know that these types of trips often provide opportunities for new experiences as well as deepening faith. Both of these things certainly proved true for the seven high school youth and three adults from Peace and St. Andrew this July. Our group left after worship on a Sunday morning, and returned eight days later the following Sunday evening with many memories and wonderful stories of our trip.

Our trip began from the parking lot of Peace as we loaded our van with suitcases and snacks to start the 1,200 mile journey across seven states. Our destination: Lutheridge, a large ELCA Lutheran camp and retreat center located near Asheville, North

Carolina in the beautiful Blue Ridge mountains. Our group was blessed with smooth travels and excellent weather for our entire trip, and our youth got to see many new parts of our country, drive along winding mountain roads, and find themselves surrounded by the tallest most green trees (and coolest summer temperatures) that they had ever experienced.





Our mid-trip travelling stop both directions was Peace Lutheran Church in Slidell, Louisiana, just east of New Orleans. For many years Peace has served as a way point for church groups, many staying there to help with the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina (which I happened to have done back in 2008). It was really nice to have a welcoming place in which to recover from our very full long days of driving. We are grateful to Pastor Barb Simmers and Peace Lutheran for their wonderful hospitality.

When we arrived at Lutheridge late that Monday evening, we found ourselves

among over 200 youth and adult leaders who were also there for a full and active week of summer camp activities. Our group stayed at a comfortable two story cabin on the edge of camp, and over the course of our four days on site, explored this vast and beautiful camp.



While there, we enjoyed the peaceful campus at Lutheridge, engaging in lots of typical summer youth camp activities, like hiking, swimming, crafts, cookouts, group building challenges, singing, and worship. Contract of the second se

However, the unique part of our week involved going offsite each day to explore, learn about and serve in many places in and around this region of North Carolina. This combination of a summer camp model combined with a mission trip focus was the reason that we chose to come all the way to Lutheridge.

Our first project of the week involved serving at the Veterans

Restoration Quarters, a 200 bed facility which is part of a wider agency called Asheville Buncombe Community Christian Ministry (ABCCM), a vital non-profit organization which addresses poverty, hunger, homelessness and access to health care for the under-served in the Asheville area. For this project, our group helped prepare cookies to take to the VRQ, spent time landscaping around the property, prepared and served lunch for the residents, spent time talking with the residents, and learned all about the variety services available at VRQ.

Much of the work that ABCCM does is done by volunteer groups, like churches and other community service organizations. It is clear that Lutheridge is developing a strong partnership with ABCCM and looks to increase their support for these programs. Before leaving, our youth went around the dining hall and thanked all of the veterans for their service to our country. It was the first but not the last experience which expanded our youth's sense of compassion and understanding.

Our second day service destination was the Cherokee Indian reservation, specifically, Living Waters Lutheran Church, an ELCA congregation serving the residents of the reservation. Led by their pastor, Rev. Jack Russell, Living Waters provides a safe and trusted place for hope, healing, resources, and worship.

Spending time at Living Waters proved to be eve opening for our group if a number ways. First of all, we did not go there to "serve". Rather we came there to listen and to learn. Pastor Jack shared with us the story of the Cherokee people, as well as his



own story of being raised attending a Lutheran boarding school and eventually becoming an ELCA pastor. He taught us some of the songs that they sing during their worship, which is a traditional Lutheran liturgy that incorporates important aspects of Cherokee culture, reflected in their sign "Christ and Culture: Hand in Hand".

In addition to its worship life, Living Waters is a distribution center for many daily necessities and



resources to the people of Cherokee. We heard powerful stories of their bravery and commitment to their community. Pastor Jack's wife leads the work of the distribution center, which is staffed by a number of their congregants. We heard many stories of the hardships faced by the native community in Cherokee, including during the pandemic, and how the church is



committed to meeting those needs with dignity and respect. As a farewell gesture of friendship, our group was invited to "sign" a rock by the church as a reminder that we are all connected as siblings in Christ.
