A Message from the Pastor

The Ten Commandments

We're now a few weeks into our summer worship series on the Ten Commandments—Words of Life, and I've been struck again by how deeply these ancient words still speak. More than just rules carved in stone, they are a living path—a way God gives us to shape our lives around what matters most.



Each commandment we've explored so far has reminded us of this truth: God's law is rooted in love. When Jesus was asked to name the greatest commandment, he said:

"Love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, and mind... and love your neighbor as yourself." (Matthew 22:37–39)

That's the heart behind every "You shall not" and every "Remember." These commandments

are not about control or guilt. They are God's way of forming a people who reflect God's own love in the world.

As we've heard in worship, the first commandments teach us to honor and trust God—no other gods, no idols, not even ourselves. They challenge us to rest in God's rhythm and speak God's name with reverence. The later commandments turn our attention outward—toward our neighbors, our families, and even the strangers among us. They invite us to live with honesty, integrity, respect, and care.

And as we move further into the series, I encourage you to ask yourself: What "gods" try to compete for your trust and attention?

How is God inviting you to love your neighbor in practical ways?

What would it look like to live these commandments not just as a moral checklist, but as a daily response to God's grace?

The commandments are a gift in a broken, selfish world to remember what how to live together by God's values which brings abundant life.

In Christ, we are freed from sin and freed for love. That's what the commandments are ultimately about—learning how to live in that freedom together. I'm grateful to walk this journey with you, and I look forward to continuing this summer of love-shaped living.

Council Corner

Here are a few of the issues the Council discussed in June.

<u>Financial Update</u> – Members should have received a mid-year update on their giving and the church's expenses. The letters were sent on July 2. Those letters also describe some major building expenses, and we want to make everyone aware. After the foundation repair in January and February of this year, an additional foundation leak was discovered, which has now been repaired. The air conditioning went out in both the fellowship hall and the conference room. The fellowship hall required a new coil and has now been repaired. A mini-split will be installed to serve the conference room. Just like in your homes, things break at the church and require repairs. The church typically anticipates about one major repair per year in its budget; this year has had several unexpected major expenses. This has depleted our building maintenance funds, so if you would like to donate to help us rebuild that reserve for future maintenance and repairs, it would be greatly appreciated.

<u>Telling Our Story</u> – The Council has continued to discuss how we can more effectively use storytelling to further our efforts to be a good news church. This month, we will show a video in worship on July 6 that celebrates the impact of Lutheran World Relief and shows what our quilters are doing for the world. Thank you to the Peaceful Piecers for the good work that they do!

Upcoming Events – Here are a few upcoming events to be aware of:

- Family Hang-Out (July 11) In support of our efforts to build community, Peace is starting to organize a
 hang-out time around once per month to allow families with children to gather together for family fun,

Congregational Update on Governance Refresh 2025

Church....Behind the Scenes

Last month Nathan Anderson was giving an update to the congregation and he mentioned that a project to refresh our congregational governance had been initiated. Governance? In a church? Well, yes, just about every organization has to have some amount of governance in place to operate with integrity in whatever the mission. Churches are no exception.

Peace Lutheran last updated its' governance documents in 2016! There have been many changes in our congregational membership since then, and we certainly don't operate today like we did in 2016! Hence, it's time to take a look at what's in place and what should be updated.

In a nutshell, what is Church Governance Reform? Church Governance Reform is about stepping back and assessing how we currently do "church" compared to how we want to do "church" as inspired by our Mission, Vision and Values; and then making the adjustments needed to align what we do and how we do it to those goals.

The range of 'things' covered by this definition is broad. It includes a definition of our ministries and how they operate, our church council organizational model, our staffing model, and office processes and procedures. Last but not least, it includes our church constitution and bylaws, which are documents we have to revise periodically to maintain compliance with our church synod requirements.

A project was kicked off in late March to refresh our governance model and documents to align to our Mission Vision and Values defined in 2023, as well as reestablish compliance with our synod. A team led by Don Hodde and staffed by Brandy Huston, Brenda Martin, Bruce Rockstroh and Cindy Thomas will work with ministry team leaders and church staff to deliver the revisions needed with intent to transition Peace Lutheran's church operations to use of the new model to kick off 2026!

There is much to be done, but we have a good team and a good foundation provided by the work done by the Mission Vision and Values team in 2023-2024. Defining governance is not the most visible and quite frankly not the most fun work you can engage in at church, but it's important to get it right in our journey maximize how we be the hands and feet of Christ to our community!


