Make us cocreators with you, that we might speak your words of love and compassion into a world in need, so that all might know your justice and peace. In Jesus' holy name we pray. Amen.



Read: Read the key verse from Sunday's reading.

In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. (Gen 1:1-2)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

God is hard at work crafting each aspect of the universe, sparing no detail. But even the Almighty Creator takes time to rest.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

- What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?
- What does it mean that you are created in God's image? What about yourself reminds you of God?
- For the littles: What is God's favorite thing that God created?



Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God continue to create and re-create you each day. Amen.



Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Pray: Light a candle and open your devotion time with a prayer.

Holy God, you did not withhold even your own Son, who willingly gave his life for the redemption of the world. Loosen our grasp on worldly things, that we might be freed from our fears of loss and inspired to risk for the good work of justice for all that you have made. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.



Read: Read the key verse from Sunday's reading.

[God] said, "Take your son, your only son Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah, and offer him there as a burnt offering on one of the mountains that I shall show you." (Genesis 22:2)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

Wood, fire, and knife. Father and son have all the elements required for their sacrifice to God. All but an animal to be offered, that is. Who could imagine the degree to which Abraham's faith is about to be tested?



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

- What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?
- How does this story make you feel? What do you think is the point of the story? When have you experienced life testing you beyond what you thought you could handle? Do you think God understood Abraham's grief when God lost Jesus to crucifixion?
- For the littles: Tell of a time you trusted someone.

May God bless you when life tests you. Amen.

Jacob is a liar and a cheat, and yet God blesses him. It seems unfair until you realize that the blessing changed Jacob and gave him new and awesome responsibility along with his new name.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

- What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?
- Tell of a time you have tried to force God's hand. What could you do to give control over some aspect of your life to God?
- For the littles: Do you know any angels?



Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God give you God's best blessing. Amen.



Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Make a list of all the ways God has blessed you. Which of these blessings come with responsibilities? Recommit yourself to taking on those responsibilities with respect.

God of promise, you call us into your holy presence and entrust us with the work of caring for your beloved children—all of humanity and all of creation. Guide us, equip us, and inspire us to follow in your way, through Jesus Christ. Amen.



Read: Read the key verse from Sunday's reading.

But Moses said to God, "If I come to the Israelites and say to them, 'The God of your ancestors has sent me to you,' and they ask me, 'What is his name?' what shall I say to them?" God said to Moses, "I AM WHO I AM." (Exodus 3:13-14)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

The God of enslaved Israel is about to make good on an ancient promise, and has a special job for his servant Moses. This would-be hero, however, is less than enthusiastic.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

- What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?
- Tell of a time you had to wait a really long time for an answer from God. What happened when the answer finally came? If you are still waiting, what are you hoping for?
- What did God mean by, "I Am Who I Am"? Consider that "I Am" is a state of being, not a state of doing.
- For the littles: Do you like your name? What have you named your dolls, stuffed animals, or action figures?

May God answer your prayers. Amen.

Read: Read the key verse from Sunday's reading.

The Lord spoke to Moses and said, "I have heard the complaining of the Israelites; say to them, 'At twilight you shall eat meat, and in the morning you shall have your fill of bread; then you shall know that I am the Lord your God." (Exodus 16:11-12)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

God has looked after the Israelites as a loving parent would: first showing them the way out of slavery, then feeding and guiding them through the wilderness. And the people respond with all the gratitude of petulant children.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

- What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?
- How, when, and with whom do you eat? Tell about your favorite mealtime experiences, and how food brought you together.
- How many different ways could the Israelites have prepared manna and quail? What else might they have eaten during their time in the desert? What would you hope to eat if you were starving?
- For the littles: What's your favorite food?

May God provide for your every need. Amen.



Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Read: Read the key verse from Sunday's reading.

Now the Lord came and stood there, calling as before, "Samuel! Samuel!" And Samuel said, "Speak, for your servant is listening." (1 Samuel 3:10)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

It takes several tries before young Samuel realizes that the one calling him in the night is God, rather than his master Eli. But delivering God's message will prove even trickier.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

- What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?
- Tell of a time God called you to do something you were reluctant to do. (When was it hard to do the right thing?) How did you find the courage to do it?
- How would your 11-year-old self have responded to a call by God?
- For the littles: What can you do to serve God?



Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God grant you courage to come when called. Amen.



Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Compare a current news story in a variety of news outlets. Check the newspaper, TV networks, and social media. How is the story different depending on whose voice is speaking? Who do you believe? Why?

Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

Samuel grieves over God's rejection of Saul as king, but he is still called to rise and anoint a replacement: David.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

- What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?
- What leadership qualities do you possess? (Everyone has some.) What other gifts has God given you? How can you use your gifts to do God's work in the world? What did God see in David? How did David's brothers feel about being passed up for the kingship?
- For the littles: What can you do because you're small that others that are big can't do?

Now there was a great wind, so strong that it was splitting mountains and breaking rocks in pieces before the Lord, but the Lord was not in the wind; and after the wind an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake; and after the earthquake a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire; and after the fire a sound of sheer silence. (1 Kings 19:11-12)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

Elijah feels defeated in his efforts to overcome the worship of Baal. God feeds him and speaks to him in whispers.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

- What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?
- Where do you hear God the loudest? Where do you see God most vividly? Where do you feel God most strongly? Listen, look, and feel God all around you this week. Why is God sometimes easiest to hear when all the other voices around us are silenced?
- For the littles: Where do you best hear or speak to God?

May God speak to you loud and clear. Amen.

- Has God ever gone back on a promise?
- For the littles: What's the first thing you do when you return home from being out?

Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego answered the king, '...If our God whom we serve is able to deliver us from the furnace of blazing fire and out of your hand, O king, let him deliver us. But if not, be it known to you, O king, that we will not serve your gods and we will not worship the golden statue that you have set up.' (Daniel 3:16-18)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego are thrown into a fiery furnace for declaring their belief in God. And just as God delivers them from the flames, God delivers the person who put them there.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

- What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?
- What things in your life or our society cry out for you to worship them? What does that worship look like? Do you find it hard to resist? Or do you try?
- When have you stood your ground even if it might have led to negative consequences for you? What happened?
- For the littles: When is it okay to break a rule?



Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God deliver you from greed and dissatisfaction with what you have. Amen.



Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Build a bonfire, beach fire, or fire in a fireplace. Write down things in your life that cause you pain and sorrow on strips of paper. Ask God to help you let these things go, and then put them in the fire.

Read: Read the key verse from Sunday's reading.

Then he said to me, "Prophesy to the breath, prophesy, mortal, and say to the breath: Thus says the Lord God: Come from the four winds, O breath, and breathe upon these slain, that they may live." (Ez 37:9)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

Yet another prophet promises God's deliverance for the exiled nation of Israel. How much longer can they take it? Ezekiel's vision must certainly be an illustration of a people desperate for life-giving breath.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

- What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?
- What vital part of you is dead or dying? What needs to happen for that part of you to be brought back to life?
- For the littles: Have you ever known someone that died? What was that like?



Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God breathe new life into you. Amen.



Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Give life to those in need. Become an organ donor (your local DMV), a blood donor (Red Cross or Memorial Blood Bank), and a bone marrow donor (NMDP Foundation).

Pray: Light a candle and open your devotion time with a prayer.

Holy God, you send out your Word of life into the world that it would accomplish your purpose of redemption for all of creation. So transform us by this Word that we might deeply internalize it and live our lives according to its guidance. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.



Read: Read the key verse from Sunday's reading.

For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return there until they have watered the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater, so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and succeed in the thing for which I sent it. (Is 55:10-11)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

Isaiah's eloquent prophecy rolls off the tongue like poetry. But more than just beautiful words, it paints a vivid illustration of a world restored, and good that triumphs over evil.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

- What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?
- Do you feel that God takes care of your needs? Why or why not?
- How does a word "accomplish that which I purpose"? (Go out into the world and return full.) Just how powerful are words?
- For the littles: Do you like to talk a lot or a little?



Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God bless your words going out and coming in. Amen.



Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Plant a wildflower seed in a pot and imagine it is God's loving Word. Tend and care for it and watch it grow into something beautiful. When the flowers eventually bloom, preserve them by drying or pressing and display them as a reminder of God's redeeming love.

 How would you make your voice heard?
- For the littles: Are you more loud or quiet?
